Program Highlights

California is the home to 22 transplant centers, four of which are located in San Diego. We are pleased to have Jose Maldonado, MD, FAPM, FACFE, professor of psychiatry, medicine, surgery, and emergency medicine at Stanford University as our key note speaker. He will discuss and provide updates on the Stanford Integrated Psychosocial Assessment for Transplant (SIPAT).

In keeping with our theme, relaxation/self-care, Melissa McCool, LCSW, will be speaking to us about Symptom Targeted Intervention (STI) Engagement Matrix to prevent professional burnout.

This year's conference will have topics suited for new social workers as well as the seasoned transplant social worker, covering all organs, adults and pediatrics, as well as other topics such as mechanical circulatory support (MCS), ethics, living donation, pregnancy after transplant and xenotransplantation.

Registration


